Church Family,

Last Sunday, we began a new sermon series on



the Ten Commandments. This series emerged from a question I received years ago from an unbelieving friend: "Why do so many churches have a copy of the Ten Commandments by their sanctuary?" When I asked him to expound on his question, he said that Christians were supposed to be a people of love and grace. By that logic, he said, our symbol should be the cross of Christ or the empty tomb; by his thinking, Christians should not desire to have their faith symbolized by a list of rules, right?

I have given his questions much thought, study, and prayer. Is grace *really* the antithesis of the Law? If so, why does Paul—the apostle of GRACE—refer to the Law and commandments as "holy, just, and good" (Romans 7:12)? Are God's commandments really just a cold list of rules? If so, why does God remind His people what He had done for them already before telling them what they should do (Exodus 20:1-2)? Should Christians *really* move on from the Ten Commandments? Though this guestion requires some nuance, it's interesting that Jesus presents Himself as the Law's fulfillment rather than nullification (Matthew 5:17-20; see also Romans 10:4). Notice how Paul frames his famous statement on the fruit of the Spirit: "For the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and selfcontrol. There is no Law against these things" (Galatians 5:22-23).

Personally, I have come to understand that God's Laws were offered to His people as a measure of grace. He called them to be a kingdom of priests and a holy nation (Exodus 19:5-6). But there was a major problem: they didn't know how to live as Israelites—they only knew how to live as Egyptians!

Remember that whole golden calf incident? So, as we discussed in last week's message, God gives His people the Law and its commandments:

1) in a context of redemption

(as I like to say—"God did not give the Law to bind his people; He gave the Law right after He set His people free!")

2) as an expression of His unchanging character and plans for His people, and

3) as a signpost to His ultimate redemptive work in Christ

There's a lot to unpack in those claims, so I hope you will join us—at Mt. Sinai, at Mt. Calvary, and in worship—as we take that journey together. If you do, I am convinced you will be comforted, convicted, and challenged by the God who does not change but, by His grace, changes us.
